LOCALIZATION THEMATIC **FRAMEWORK** 

### Localization

The heart of the transformation, placing people at the center of funding, decision-making, and action to reduce disaster risks and vulnerabilities.

Supported by 50+ donors and aid agencies through the WHS Grand Bargain.

### Goal

Strengthening national and local actors to enhance self-reliance, reduce dependency on international aid, and ensure sustainable development.

ADPC defines localization as a process that strengthens national and local actors to lead in defining, planning, and implementing disaster preparedness, response, recovery, and climate actions toward safer, well-prepared, and resilient communities.


### Influence and visibility

### ASIAN PREPAREDNESS PARTNERSHIP: A MULTI-STAKEHOLDER APPROACH TO LOCALIZATION

- ADPC's flagship program aimed at promoting localization
- Established in 2017, supported by the Gates Foundation
- Supports national actors establish National Preparedness Partnerships (NPPs), which bring together diverse key stakeholders.





Launched on July 30, 2024, the ADRF empowers NPPs to drive locally-led Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) efforts, enhancing preparedness, recovery, risk reduction, and climate action. The Fund enables NPPs to mobilize, engage, and support initiatives that ensure no one is left behind.

### **APP+ APPROACH**

The achievements of the multi-stakeholder approach for locally-led actions under APP have generated interest beyond the core APP countries. Through the 'APP+' approach, other countries in the region with high-risk profiles and strong networks for local actors have shown interest in replicating the multi-stakeholder country partnership model. At the same time, the APP+ approach facilitates south-south learning and knowledge exchange between the APP countries and other countries in the region and beyond where ADPC has flagship programs on enhancing Disaster Risk Management (DRM).

### **CO-CREATING DIVERSE LOCALIZATION MODELS**

ADPC is currently implementing the Strengthening Partnerships for Community Resilience in Indonesia and Timor-Leste (SPRINT) project with local civil society organizations (CSOs). SPRINT aims to mitigate disaster impacts, decrease reliance on external aid, and promote faster, more resilient recovery. The project strengthens the institutional, leadership, technical, and organizational capacities of local organizations, empowering them to lead disaster resilience efforts.

In 2025, ADPC will continue working alongside member countries to co-create diverse localization models, such as women-led, inclusive local government approaches, and children and youth-led initiatives, among others. Support for the Asian Disaster Readiness Fund (ADRF) will be instrumental in advancing both current and newly created localization models.
