REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF REPUBLIC ACT NO. 11494 OR THE BAYANIHAN TO RECOVER AS ONE ACT

04 JANUARY 2021

In compliance with Section 14 of Republic Act (RA) No. 11494 or the "Bayanihan to Recover as One Act" (Bayanihan 2), I respectfully submit the recent updates and developments relative to our whole-of-government response to the COVID-19 pandemic. This report contains updates on the programs and activities of 46 departments, agencies, and instrumentalities of the Executive branch, most of which were reported to the Office of the Executive Secretary on 28 December 2020 (Monday). The comments of our Senators on the previous report on the implementation of Bayanihan 2 have been cascaded to all agencies in the Executive branch, and taken into account in the preparation of this submission.

The government continues to implement programs and projects that seek to (1) reduce the adverse socioeconomic impact of COVID-19; (2) enhance the capacity of the Philippine health care system to control and eliminate COVID-19; (3) accelerate the recovery and bolster the resilience of the Philippine economy; and (4) enhance fiscal and monetary policies to sustain COVID-19 measures, pursuant to existing laws and issuances.

In the interest of protecting the health and safety of the Filipino people and upon the recommendation of the Inter-Agency Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF), I approved measures to address the risks posed by the new variant of the SARS-CoV-2 (B.1.1.7 or VUI 2020/12/01) including the temporary suspension of flights from, and the prohibition of entry on all foreign travelers coming from the United Kingdom and twenty (20) other countries/jurisdictions¹ with confirmed cases of the new variant.

This 2021, ongoing efforts in addressing the impact of the pandemic will be further sustained with the passage of RA No. 11518 or the "Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 General Appropriations Act (GAA)." The government will continue to do its best to defeat the COVID-19 pandemic and other challenges, and build back better and healthier.

I. Reduction of the Adverse Socioeconomic Impact of COVID-19

Update on the Social Amelioration Programs (SAPs)

As of 02 January 2021, PhP1.7 Billion has been disbursed for the emergency cash subsidy of 251,776 families out of the total target of 568,026 additional low-income non-4Ps family beneficiaries (those qualified but were not previously granted subsidy as mandated under RA No. 11469 or the "Bayanihan to Heal as One Act"; PhP260 Million for the emergency cash subsidy of 49,039 families out of the total target of 75,065 low-income non-4Ps families in granular lockdown areas; and, as of 20 December 2020, PhP658,134,969.04 to 45,889 families out of the total target of 65,771 families under the Livelihood Assistance Grants of the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD).

The Department of Agriculture (DA), as of 15 December 2020, has provided cash assistance to a total of 51,064 beneficiaries, and food assistance to 44,479 beneficiaries out of the target 890,794 farmers and fisherfolks registered in the Registry System for Basic Sectors in Agriculture (RSBSA).⁵ As of December 2020, the fund utilization rate of the program is at 22% or equivalent to PhP1 Billion out of the PhP4.5 Billion allotted funding.

The Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) is fast-tracking the full implementation of the Philippine Identification System (PhilSys) under RA No. 110556 to assist in improving the targeting and distribution of financial assistance to poor and low-income households under the SAPs. Out of the 9,260,155 individuals (equivalent to 110% of the 2020 registration target) registered under the PhilSys, five (5) million low-income household heads have been identified as part of the demographic capture. The biometrics and capture, which is the second step under the PhilSys, will commence in January until February 2021.

SAPs for the Labor Sector

The Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) continues to provide cash assistance to affected workers of the formal sector though the COVID-19 Adjustment Measures Program (CAMP), which served beneficiaries from the private sector, tourism sector and education sector. The DOLE likewise continues to serve beneficiaries from the informal sector through the *Tulong Panghanapbuhay Para Sa Ating Disadvantaged/Displaced Workers* (TUPAD).

The DOLE also continues to provide assistance to our overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) through the CAMP - Abot Kamay sa Pagtulong (AKAP) and food, transportation and accommodation assistance to repatriated OFWs.

SAP for the Transportation Industry

As part of the various forms of assistance to critically impacted businesses in the transport industry, the Department of Transportation (DOTr) is implementing the

Provision of Support to Road-Based Public Transport Stakeholders Through Direct Cash Subsidies, a one-time cash grant which may be used for payment of loans and various operational expenses. From 16 November 2020 to 21 December 2020, the DOTr, through the Land Transportation and Franchise Regulatory Board, disbursed the total amount of PhP779,109,500.00, or 67.09% of the PhP1,161,214,210.00 total allotment for the program, to 119,863 qualified public utility vehicle units nationwide.

Transportation, Repatriation, and Mobility Assistance to Health Workers, Frontliners, OFWs, Stranded Passengers, and Other Entities or Individuals

The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) has been establishing the *Metropolitan Bike Lane Networks*, a 490.726-kilometer inter-city bike lane within the cities in the National Capital Region (NCR) and Region VII, and within Davao City. As of 30 December 2020, all bike-lane projects within the NCR and Davao City have been awarded to the winning bidders and the contracts are already in process, while bike-lane projects for cities within Region VII are already undergoing construction.

Education-Related Assistance

The Department of Budget and Management (DBM) has released to the Department of Education (DepEd), the Special Allotment Release Order (SARO) to effect the realignment of the PhP1,194,066,000 sourced from the FY 2019 Continuing Appropriations and FY 2020 Current Appropriations for the implementation of the Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan (BE-LCP). The realigned funds shall cover the additional Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) requirements of Central Office, Regional Offices, Schools Division Offices and Schools.

The DBM has also released to the DepEd the SARO which covers the reallocation of PhP2.4 Billion of the PhP4 Billion fund,⁹ for the purchase of information and communications technology devices to implement the BE-LCP.

As of 15 December 2020, 15 schools with a total loan amount of PhP522 Million have been approved under the Access to Academic Development to Empower the Masses towards Endless Opportunities (ACADEME) Lending Program. Two additional

schools have completed the loan requirements and are scheduled for deliberation, while 21 other schools have signified intention to avail the lending program and are in the process of completing their respective documents.

Ensuring Availability of Essential Goods

The DA has continued its efforts to support and sustain household food security. Onder its Urban Agriculture Program, the DA has distributed starter kits to 42,242 beneficiaries out of 64,735 target beneficiaries, utilizing PhP17.5 Million out of PhP27.7 Million total funding. On the other hand, under the Rice Resiliency Project for Dry Season program, PhP1.37 Million out of the PhP4.5 Billion allotted funding has been utilized for the preparation, organization, and procurement of seeds and fertilizers for the project.

Protection of Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDLs)

As of 07 December 2020, the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology has monitored the release of 47,577 PDLs. Out of this number, 794 are elderly, 1,252 are sick or with pre-existing conditions, 39 are pregnant, and 42 are with disabilities.

Assistance to Women, Children, and Other Vulnerable Groups

The Philippine National Police (PNP), in partnership with the Philippine Commission on Women, continues to monitor and provide assistance to women and children. As of 17 December 2020, the PNP has recorded a total of 9,302 cases of violations against women and 11,015 cases of violence against children since the first implementation of an Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ).

Products and Prices Regulation¹⁴

Sugar prices from groceries and wet markets in Metro Manila and Visayas are within the range of the suggested retail price, as monitored by the Sugar Regulatory Administration. As of 13 December 2020, the sugar stocks in trader's warehouses and mills in Luzon remain to be sufficient, while the estimated raw sugar stock balance in sugar traders' warehouses and mills in Luzon is 32,800 Lkg bags and the estimated refined sugar stock balance is 472,000 Lkg bags.

II. Enhancement of the Health Care System Capacity to Control and Eliminate COVID-19

Continuing Efforts on Information Dissemination

The Department of Health (DOH) continues to arm Filipinos with the knowledge to defeat COVID-19 through its "BIDA Solusyon sa COVID-19" and "Tuloy-tuloy ang Paskong Pinoy" campaigns.

At the onset of the holiday season, the Presidential Communications Operations Office (PCOO), together with the IATF, came up with a unified messaging for an anticipated surge of COVID-19 cases through message integration of the *BIDA Solusyon* and Mask, Hugas, Iwas campaigns.

The PCOQ also released information materials on the vaccine roadmap and other pertinent information on the COVID-19 vaccine development to keep the public informed of the government's proactive plan in acquiring safe and effective vaccines for the public.

Detection of Cases: Update on Expanded Testing, Testing Centers, and Test Kits

The DOH continues to formulate and lead the implementation of interventions to improve and enhance the prevention and detection of COVID-19 cases, and maintain the healthcare system's surge capacity through quarantine and isolation.

On 07 December 2020, the DOH has approved the guidelines for the use of pooled testing¹⁵ for screening and surveillance of individuals in low prevalence populations or settings. This procedure increases the number of individuals that can be tested while reducing the turnaround time and saving supplies.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA)¹⁶ observes the 72-hour processing time for the issuance of a Special Certification for COVID-19 test kits. For the month of December 2020, 30 COVID-19 test kits (12 RT-PCR, 8 rapid antibody tests, and 10 rapid antigen) were approved by the FDA, with 100% of all applications processed within 72 hours from receipt.

As of 17 December 2020, there are 196 COVID-19 licensed laboratories nationwide, of which 151 are RT-PCR and 45 are GENEXPERT laboratories. 140 of these COVID-19 testing laboratories nationwide are Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) accredited, 34 of which were accredited in December 2020.

On 07 December 2020, the Philippine Ports Authority (PPA) commenced shouldering the costs for the RT-PCR test of returning Filipino seafarers arriving at Philippine ports and airports where One-Stop Shops for Seafarers are established. This intervention, with a total budget of PhP270,000,000.00, has benefited 151 out of a total target of 60,000 beneficiaries as of 21 December 2020.

On investment facilitation of medical-related products such as test kits, the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), through the Board of Investments (BOI), has issued one (1) Certificate of Authority and processed Four (4) Certificates of Authority annotated for accreditation in accordance with DTI – Department of Finance (DOF) Joint Memorandum Circular (JMC) 20-05 as of 16 December 2020. JMC 20-05 provides for requirements and processes for compliance by the manufacturing enterprises seeking entitlement to exemption from import duties, taxes and fees.

Temporary Treatment and Monitoring Facilities (TTMFs) and COVID-19 Bed Capacity

As of 17 December 2020, hospitals throughout the country have 23,857 dedicated beds for COVID-19, with a 37% bed occupancy rate. To increase capacity and ensure compliance with the required dedicated bed allocation, the DOH, through a joint advisory with the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) and Metro Manila Development Authority has called on private hospitals to abide by the requirement of allocating 20% of its bed capacities for COVID-19 patients.

In preparation for the anticipated post-holiday surge, the DOH directed the Centers for Health Development (CHDs) to coordinate with the local chief executives to prepare health system mitigation plans, and to enforce frequent operational monitoring and flagging of areas of attention, including monitoring of adherence to minimum public health standards and the Infection Prevention and Control protocol, through the BIDA *Bastonero* Initiative.¹⁷

As of 17 December 2020, the DOH has downloaded capital outlay funds to DOH hospitals and the Philippine General Hospital to fast track the construction of temporary isolation and quarantine facilities, field hospitals, dormitories for healthcare workers and expansion of hospital capacities to cater to COVID-19 patients. A COVID-19 facility extension with a 110-bed capacity located at the Quezon Institute, Quezon City to be operated by Jose R. Reyes Memorial Medical Center will be operational with 44 beds by the 2nd week of January 2021.

As of 17 December 2020, there are 10,946 reporting TTMFs with 167,671 vacant beds nationwide, which are managed by local government units (LGUs) catering to recovering, confirmed, suspect, and probable COVID-19 cases. There are also 2,696 beds available at the 15 reporting MEGA LIGTAS COVID facilities managed by the National Government, for a total of 170,367 beds nationwide.

The One Hospital Command Center (OHCC) continues to provide information, data analytics, and coordination services for the referral of COVID-19 suspects, probable, and confirmed cases. Regional OHCCs have been established in 16 regions to help ensure the efficient coordination and utilization of our health resources for the care of COVID-19 patients. As of 10 December 2020, a total of 7,681 out of 7,688 patients have been referred to other hospitals by the OHCC.

Strengthening Contact Tracing Measures¹⁸

The DOH continues to partner with the DILG on strengthening LGU capacity for contact tracing. With the technical support of the DOH's COVID-19 Surveillance and Quick Action Unit (CSQUA), the Contact Tracing Manual drafted by the DILG has been approved.

To strengthen national capacity for contact tracing, the DOH, through the CSQUA, coordinated with private sector entities on the training of trainers for contact tracing. Contact tracing training were provided to the support staff of Regional Epidemiology Surveillance Units (RESUs) and City Epidemiology Surveillance Unit (CESUs). Technical support was also provided by the DOH through the piloting of parallel contact tracing statistics monitoring system disaggregated per region to support generation of chronological contact tracing data.

As of 19 December 2020, the DILG has hired an additional 49,945 contact tracers. Similarly, LGUs have organized a total of 30,892 contact tracing teams with 265,740 members. Of this number, 158,905 contact tracers were already trained with 1,905,286 close contacts traced and monitored. The current ratio for close contact tracing is still 1:6, where in every one (1) active case, the closest six (6) contacts is placed in isolation.

Following relevant issuances on Minimum Health Protocols (MHPs), particularly IATF Resolution No. 85 dated 26 November 2020, and the DTI-DOLE Advisory 20-03 dated 01 December 2020, 3,135 establishments were monitored nationwide for compliance with the MHPs from 01-23 December 2020. Only 35% of these were found to be using a digital contact tracing application, and only 101 establishments were using the government's official digital tracing application, StaySafe.ph, as most had either in-house or LGU-developed systems.

In the NCR, the monitoring of MHPs resulted in the issuance of Requests for Corrective Action to 18 firms, which represent an initial compliance rate of 81%.

Human Resources for Health (HRH)19

The DOH continues to hire additional HRH. On 22 December 2020, a total of 12,957 (76.43%) HRH have been hired out of the 16,953 approved slots for emergency hiring in priority health facilities. The DOH has redeployed a total of 10,524 nurses in the Nurses Development Program (3,582 in Luzon and 6,942 in Visayas and Mindanao) in primary care facilities to participate in hospital-based and community-based COVID-19 responses, while 4,265 HRH under the DOH HRH Deployment Program are currently engaged in COVID-19 response. Out of the 49 approved slots, 36 medical graduates have been given special authority by the DOH to serve as Deputized Physicians.

The total funds allocated for HRH Emergency Hiring for COVID-19 response, as of 22 December 2020, is PhP2.8 Billion, consisting of PhP1.7 Billion from DBM-approved funds and PhP1.1 Billion from repurposed funds. Of the total funds, 88.18% (PhP2.5 Billion) have been sub-allotted to several health facilities (e.g., COVID referral hospitals, DOH Designated Diagnostic Facilities, and DOH Hospitals); 4.00% (PhP115 Million) is to be allocated once the pending Sub-Allotment Guidelines of other health facilities (with approved health personnel slots for hiring) is approved; and 7.82% (PhP226 Million) is allotted for health facilities with future needs.

As of 21 December 2020, 1,361 checks were delivered to public and private health workers for sickness and death compensation with a total amount of PhP92,965,000.00, broken down as follows: PhP9,165,000.00 incurred for Mild/Moderate compensation; PhP9,800,000.00 for Severe/Critical; and PhP74,000,000.00 for Death. There are 2,110 remaining checks for preparation or issuance, while there are still 6,765 claims for evaluation.

As of 22 December 2020, in accordance with Administrative Order Nos. 35^{24} (s.2020) and 36^{25} (s.2020), the DOH has sub-allotted the total amount of PhP8,717,335,353.89 for the grant of Special Risk Allowance and Actual Hazard Duty Pay to health workers in DOH retained hospitals and CHDs, LGU owned or operated hospitals, laboratories, medical and quarantine facilities, DOH-deployed HRH, private hospitals and HRH under emergency hiring. The amount of PhP395,284,000.00 is for transfer to the hospitals in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao and government-owned or —controlled corporations. Moreover, a total of PhP3,296,287,460.00 funds have been sub-alloted to CHDs and DOH hospitals to cover life insurance, accommodation, transportation, and meals of all public and private health workers.²⁶

Immunization²⁷

The DOH, through the CHDs and the Expanded Immunization Program coordinators, continues to coordinate with LGUs for the immunization campaigns and social mobilization activities such as Measles and Rubella (MR) and Bivalent Oral Polio Vaccine (bOPV). As of December 2020, a total of 4,054,966 vaccine vials for MR and 1,909,963 vaccines vials for bOPV have been distributed across regions.

The DOH, through its Procurement and Supply Chain Management-Task Group on Cold Chain and Logistics Management, a task group under the COVID-19 Vaccine Deployment Program, has crafted an operational plan with proposed storage and distribution processes, implementation timelines, and cost estimates.²⁸

Provision of Healthcare Resources, Supplies, and Equipment

As of 12 December 2020, the following have been paid by the PhilHealth: 8,653 claims for health workers amounting to PhP595,324,799.03 for COVID-19 inpatient services;²⁹ 5,861 claims amounting to PhP1,465,994,790.03 for the Benefit Package for Inpatient Care of Probable and Confirmed COVID-19 Developing Severe Illness/Outcomes;³⁰ 73,063 claims amounting to PhP316,856,145.00 for the Benefit Package for Testing for SARS-CoV-2;³¹ and 196 claims amounting to PhP4,400,004.00 for the COVID-19 Community Isolation Benefit Package.³² A total of 758,938 claims amounting to PhP2,741,262,725.00 have likewise been paid to the Philippine Red Cross.³³

With respect to the release and reimbursement of funds due to district, provincial, and city hospitals,³⁴ the PhilHealth reports that out of the total amount of PhP14,970,850,093.58 funded through the Interim Reimbursement Mechanism (IRM), a total of PhP12,927,038,729.00 has been liquidated and accounted for as of 12 December 2020. From the 711 facilities provided with funds through the IRM, 343 facilities have fully liquidated the same.

As of 22 December 2020, the DOH Donations Team has facilitated a total of 321 local and foreign donations to the DOH. A total of 220 transactions (68.5%) have been completed, while 76 foreign donations and 25 local donations are being facilitated. A total of 1,775,301 RT-PCR test kits have been received from 15 donors, and the number of other donated medical products are as follows: (i) 7,754,616 pieces of surgical masks; (ii) 925,440 pieces of N95 masks; (iii) 504 units of ventilators; and (iv) 3,594,115 pieces of personal protective equipment (PPEs)/medical coveralls. Of these, a total of 65,202 donated PPEs were distributed to various government offices, DOH facilities, and LGUs, in addition to the 85,100 procured PPEs distributed to different health facilities.

On 15 December 2020, the DOH issued the "Guidelines on the Distribution of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), Testing Kits and Other Laboratory Supplies and Equipment for Health Facilities and Laboratories Providing Health Services to Suspected, Probable, and Confirmed Cases of Coronavirus Disease-19 (COVID-19)," to streamline the allocation and distribution processes and to ensure adequate supply in COVID-19 facilities.

Emergency Use Authorization for COVID-19 Drugs and Vaccines

The DOH, through the FDA and the Single Joint Ethics Review Board, is conducting the regulatory and initial clinical trial application review of the following vaccines: Sinovac (Inactivated Covid-19 Vaccines); Clover (Protein Subunit Covid-19 Vaccine); and Janssen Vaccines (Adenovirus).

Funding for Vaccine

The National Economic and Development Authority - Investment Coordination Committee has facilitated the reallocation of \$25,000,000.00 from the Health System Enhancement to Address and Limit (HEAL) COVID-19 Project and \$30,000,000.00 from the Philippines COVID-19 Emergency Response Project (PCERP) or a total of \$55,000,000.00 to pay for the advance market commitments and advance payments for COVID-19 vaccines by 31 December 2020. The additional funding amounting to \$300,000,000.00 from the HEAL COVID-19 Project and another \$300,000,000.00 from the PCERP shall be re-allocated and made available once the vaccines are proven effective.

Other Measures

To help curb the spread of COVID-19, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR)-Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) issued a total of 1,242 Special Permits to Transport healthcare wastes, sufficient to cover 37,126.76 tons of healthcare wastes. Through the use of an Online Manifest System for Hazardous Wastes, the EMB facilitates the processing of all applications for permits and clearances relating to hazardous wastes.³⁵

III. <u>Acceleration of the Recovery and Bolstering the Resilience of the Philippine Economy</u>

For Micro, Small and Medium-Scale Enterprises (MSMEs) and Other Key Sectors³⁶

To provide assistance to the agricultural sector,³⁷ the DA through the Agricultural Credit Policy Council, has released to 32 partner lending conduits a total credit fund of PhP1.465 Billion out of the PhP2.5 Billion total funding³⁸ under its Expanded SURE-Aid and Recovery Project.³⁹

As of 15 December 2020, the Land Bank of the Philippines (LBP), through the Interim Rehabilitation Support to Cushion Unfavorably-affected Enterprises by COVID-19 (IRESCUE) Program, has approved PhP2.875 Billion loans out of the PHP10 Billion allocation. While the IRESCUE Program was originally available only to MSMEs, it was modified in October 2020 to include large enterprises, such as the hotel and airline industries, as possible beneficiaries.

The COVID-19 Assistance to Restart Enterprises (CARES) Program of the DTI has received a total of 33,630 applications as of 23 December 2020, 19,449 of which have been approved amounting to PhP1.6 Billion. In the pipeline are the release of

2,440 approved loan applications, and the processing of 2,884 other prequalified applications.

The DTI has pushed for the upskilling of MSMEs to transform their businesses digitally. From September to December, the DTI completed three (3) more editions of the CTRL+Biz Reboot Now Webinar Series – *Kain Na* (tourism), Digital Marketing Week, and Logistics. The Logistics edition, which was concluded on the last working day of November, drew the largest number of participants with 8,872. It educated MSMEs on topics such as Supply Chain Strategic Management, Materials Management and Inventory Control, and Transport Management and Cargo Handling Strategies.

Pursuant to Section 4(pp)(5) of Bayanihan 2, the DTI continues to implement the Livelihood Seeding Program - Negosyo Serbisyo sa Barangay, which focuses on expanding the Negosyo Center services in identified barangays and MSMEs affected by natural and human-induced calamities, including health disasters arising from epidemics and pandemics, to promote entrepreneurship and bridge the income inequality gaps in the peripheries. As of 23 December 2020, 52,159 MSMEs and 354,245 individuals in over 5,742 barangays have been granted assistance amounting to PhP169.37 Million.

In line with Section 4(jj),⁴⁰ the DTI has facilitated online business matching/meetings, to explore more opportunities for Philippine export products in other countries, which is now the new normal for trade promotion activities, and to usher digital acceleration of Philippine exporters.

Access to Agri-Fishery Products and Ensuring an Uninterrupted Supply Chain⁴¹

The BOI has liberalized its policies under the current Investment Priorities Plan in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In particular, the BOI has introduced amendments to the specific guidelines on food irradiation projects under the agriculture, fishery and forestry sectors to further simplify documentary requirements. Food irradiation services support the country's agriculture sector in mitigating post-harvest losses and increasing the sector's supply value chain. In general, these policies will encourage investments on new business projects and/or expansion of existing businesses that would in turn generate employment while adopting health and safety measures.

Sixty (60)-Day Grace Period for Loans⁴² and Related Moratoriums

From 03 to 04 December 2020, the DOF issued guidelines and circulars to implement Sections $4(vv)^{43}$ and $(uu)^{44}$ of *Bayanihan 2*, to wit:

- (1) Guidelines on provision of financial relief and credit programs for MSMEs, cooperatives, self-employed, institutions of learning, and other sectors critically impacted by the pandemic;
- (2) Directing all institutions providing electric, water, telecommunications, and other similar utilities to provide a minimum 30-day grace period for the payment of utilities falling due within the period of implementation of ECQ and Modified ECQ;⁴⁵ and

(3) On the provision of the one-time 60-day grace period for all existing, current, and outstanding loans falling due, or any part thereof, on or before 31 December 2020.⁴⁶

The Securities and Exchange Commission has continued to monitor compliance of financing and lending companies with the 60-day grace period. All complainants have been advised to submit supporting documents against erring companies.⁴⁷

The Philippine Guarantee Corporation (PhilGuarantee) has implemented the 60-day grace period, including a moratorium on the payment of premium on the renewal of guarantee coverage to borrowers under the housing programs and restructured accounts, and to beneficiaries in the agriculture sector, specifically small farmers and fisherfolks whose unsecured/guaranteed loans were used for palay and food production. As of December 2020, the PhilGuarantee has assisted 13 Accredited Financial Institutions by way of availment of the 60-day grace period for the renewal of guarantee coverage of 4,717 housing loans worth PhP7.2 Billion with a corresponding penalty of PhP2.78 Million waived, and has served a total of 191 borrowers under its housing program and restructured accounts program.

The Development Bank of the Philippines has continued to implement a Credit Policy to apply the 60-day grace period to existing current and outstanding loans with principal and/or interest, including amortizations. As of November 2020, 360 borrowers with loans, 2,367 with provident fund loans, and 18,115⁴⁸ with salary loans have benefitted from the said grace period.

As of 18 December 2020, the Government Service Insurance System (GSIS) has processed the loans of 61,500 active members and released a total net proceeds of PhP3.42 Billion under its Multi-Purpose Loan and Consolidation of Debts Program. Under the GSIS Computer Loan Program which provides a PhP30,000 financial assistance to GSIS members and their families for the purchase of computer units for online work or virtual classes of their children, the GSIS has released a total net proceeds of PhP1.87 Billion to 63,717 active members.

Additionally, the GSIS has allocated a total budget of PhP20 Billion for the GSIS Financial Assistance Loan - Educational Loan Program, which aims to provide assistance for the payment of tuition fees and/or other school expenses. Under the aforementioned program, GSIS members are given a 10-year loan with a 5-year grace period and a maximum loanable amount per school year of PhP100,000.00.

The GSIS has also released a total net proceeds of PhP10.54 Billion in Emergency Loans to 587,702 active members and old-age pensioners. This is in addition to the PhP12 Billion granted to 48,549 active members and pensioners who applied for Consolidated Loan, Policy Loan, and Pension Loan online. Likewise, a total net proceeds of PhP10.07 Billion has been released to 280,454 active members and pensioners who applied for loan through the GSIS Wireless Automated Processing System or the "GW@PS" kiosks.

Other Relief Measures49

On 22 December 2020, in line with Section 4(nnn)⁵⁰ of the *Bayanihan 2*, the DOF, DTI, and DENR approved the implementing rules and regulations on the grant of regulatory relief, including the waiver of certain permits, licenses, or other requirements, to private projects determined to be nationally significant, with high economic returns or high employment potential.

To continuously educate the members and stakeholders of the Social Security System (SSS) on the different benefits and programs, the SSS has launched an ExpreSSS e-Learning (ExSSSeL) Portal. The ExSSSeL Portal is a free online computer-based training program that will help the SSS reach out to more stakeholders at their most convenient pace and time, and in the comfort and safety of their own homes.⁵¹

IV. <u>Enhancement of Fiscal and Monetary Policies to Sustain COVID-19</u> <u>Measures</u>

Budgetary Measures to Fund COVID-19 Efforts

As of 26 November 2020, the DBM has released funds to the following departments/agencies for their COVID-19-related projects, activities and programs (P/A/Ps), out of the PhP140 Billion appropriations under the *Bayanihan 2*:

Considering that the effectivity of *Bayanihan 2* expired on 19 December 2020, the OP approved allotments will be processed once the validity of the law is extended through the bill certified as urgent by the President.

The release of the remaining appropriations under the *Bayanihan 2* will be made upon the extension of the validity of *Bayanihan 2* and the submission of the corresponding budget requests and supporting documents by the implementing agencies, consistent with existing budgeting laws, rules and regulations.

The DOF has secured a total of USD13.9 Billion in financing from international development partners and the commercial markets, of which USD13.32 Billion was secured from the Asian Development Bank, World Bank, Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank, Agence Française de Développement, Japan International Cooperation Agency, Export-Import Bank of Korea, and the issuance of USD-denominated global bonds in April and December 2020.

The Bureau of the Treasury raised PhP6.56 Billion from the second issuance of the *Premyo* bonds, which was offered from 11 November 2020 until 11 December 2020. The amount surpassed both this year's target of PhP3.0 Billion and last year's sale of PhP4.96 Billion.

With respect to the various tax relief measures under *Bayanihan 2*, the DOF's initial estimates on the revenue impact are as follows:⁵³

Budgetary Support for LGUs for Anti-COVID-19 Efforts⁵⁸

In view of the extension of the period of the State of Calamity throughout the country pursuant to Proclamation No. 1021 dated 16 September 2020, the validity of the *Bayanihan* Grants to LGUs provided under Local Budget Circular Nos. 125 and 126⁵⁹ was likewise automatically extended.

As of 19 December 2020, the fund utilization reports from 1,144 LGUs have been submitted to and consolidated by the DBM covering 62 provinces, 103 cities, and 979 municipalities. The consolidated reports cover PhP23.604 Billion worth of P/A/Ps or 63.76% of the total *Bayanihan* Grants released to LGUs with the following breakdown:

On 04 December 2020, the DOF issued the rules and regulations for the utilization of the unreleased balances of the Municipal Development Fund (MDF) for the government's COVID-19 related expenditures and LGU lending.⁶⁰

On 15 December 2020, the Municipal Development Fund Office (MDFO) executed a Deed assigning all the remaining balances in the MDF and existing loan agreements between MDFO and LGUs to the LBP to be used for lending to LGUs. The funds transferred amounted to PhP13.125 Billion, consisting of PhP1.713 Billion cash and PhP11.413 Billion non-cash items.

A total of PhP51.68 Million out of PhP120 Million fund allocation has already been obligated for the RSBSA updating.

As of 03 December 2020. The refocused budget under the Bayanihan 1 is being utilized for the Urban Agriculture Program. Under the Bayanihan 2, 10.67% out of the PhP400 Million allocated funds has been obligated as of December 2020.

Under this program, the DA will provide farmer-beneficiaries with high-quality seeds and fertilizers for free to increase overall rice production in the country.



In order to address delays in the implementation and immediately stimulate economic activity and generate employment during the state of national emergency as declared by the President, notwithstanding any law to the contrary, permits, licenses, certificates, clearances, consents, authorizations or resolutions by national government agencies, except those relating to taxes, duties, border control and environmental laws and regulations, may be waived for private projects that are nationally significant or those with high economic returns or high employment potential xxx.

procurement of equipment, reagents and kits for COVID-19 testing; procurement of disinfectants, sprayers, disinfection tents and other disinfecting supplies and misting equipment; expenses for the purchase/rental of tents/spaces for temporary shelters of the homeless; expenses for the operation of stand-alone/mobile testing laboratory; expenses for training of personnel in the conduct of COVID-19 testing and other related trainings; and other necessary COVID-19-related P/A/Ps and expenses.

Section 4(ttt). Any unutilized or unreleased balance in the Municipal Development Fund created under Presidential Decree No. 1914 including investments and undrawn portions of all loans shall be considered to have their purpose abandoned. All such unspent, unutilized, unreleased, or undrawn money or funds shall be utilized and are hereby automatically appropriated for LGU loans and borrowings from the GFIs, including the provision of loan interest rate subsidy until 2022, and such measures to address the COVID-19 situation and accomplish the declared national policy herein: xxx provided, finally, that the Ten Billion Peso proceeds of the MDFO investments in government securities are hereby automatically appropriated for such measures to address the COVID-19 situation and accomplish the declared national policy herein.
