COMMUNITY ACTION FOR DISASTER RESPONSE (CADRE)

The course is designed to train the community volunteers with basic knowledge and skills to respond safely to disasters and emergencies.

the CADRE course was developed by the Program for Enhancement of Emergency Response (PEER) with technical support from the Asian Disaster Preparedness Center (ADPC) and the American Red Cross (ARC) funded by USAID Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance. First introduced in Asia in 2009, the course has been the foundation training of community response teams in Bangladesh, India, Nepal, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Cambodia, Lao PDR, Vietnam, Thailand, Indonesia, and the Philippines implemented by the Civil Defense, Fire Department, Red Cross/Red Crescent National Societies and other community volunteer organizations.



Who can enroll in the course?

The CADRE course is designed to train community-level volunteers and other community members who are capable of being Community **Emergency Responders.**
